Mr. Clem. Edwards, M.P. and the Farmer: Meeting at Fochriw Mr. Clement Edwards, M.P. for East Glamorgan, addressed a meeting at Fochriw on Friday night, and dealt with the land question. Mr. Edwards gave a number of illustrations showing how the spirit of liberty was being killed in the rural districts by the farmers being dependent for their tenancy upon the personal goodwill of the landlord. Many farmers had been turned out of their farms because of their political, religious or social views. The Government's land policy would, however, cover cases of this sort, and in future, bad husbandry and non-payment of rent would constitute the only effective ground for getting rid of tenants. Landlords would be compelled to pay substantial damages for disturbance. Again, the low wages, lack of small cottage accommodation, and the oppression of the tie-cottage system, often made life intolerable to the agricultural labourer. He did not come to work in the collieries of South Wales because of the beauty of the work, but because he had the breath of freedom and better wages than he got on the land. Mr. Edwards also anticipated the restoration to the people of common lands taken by landlords, the adjustment of the anomalous leasehold system, and the realisation of an equitable system of rating in towns.

When the deceased came to Fochriw, there only existed Williams-row, called the 'old houses,' and two houses by the Rising Sun, in one of which he lived with his parents. His wife died 13 years ago. He was a member of Noddfa Baptist Chapel. He has three sons and one daughter, by whom he will be greatly missed. His genial countenance and kindly presence will be missed in the neighbourhood. The funeral took place at Pant on Wednesday and was well attended. A short service was held in the house, Rev. Isaac Roderick, Nazareth, officiating. The well-known hymn 'Pa'm carai'r byd,' was sung by the house, after which the solemn cortege wended its way to the station, and from thence by special train to Pant. Rev. Rhys Jones officiated at the grave. The chief mourners were: Messrs. William, Thomas and Charles Edwards (sons); Messrs. A Weigher Found Dead at No. 2 Pit, Fochriw

The death of T. Lewis Davies, a weigher at No. 2 Pit, Fochriw, was first enquired into at an inquest at the Talbot Inn, Penydarren. Lewis Williams, a banksman at the pit, said he found the deceased dead in the weigh-house soon after 3.30 a.m. on Friday morning. He was lying on his back on the floor. He had seen the deceased several times during the night, and was in the weigh-room at 3 a.m., the last time he had seen the deceased alive. He was quite as usual then. The body was not moved before the doctor came to the weigh-house. Dr. E. Davies J. P., Fochriw, said that he examined the body and that there were no bruises or marks on him. The eyes were normal. In his opinion the cause of death was cardiac failure, and a verdict to that effect was returned.
