Jones (Asaph Glan Morlais), of Dowlais, sang the "Soldier's grave" with great effect, and received loud applause; Mr. J. Harris, Pontsticill, sang a comic song in good style; and the Vochriw Glee Party, under the leadership of Mr. H. M. Williams, gave the "Quarrymen's Chorus," which was well received; Miss Maggie Lewis of Dowlais sang the pathetic song "Too late," in an impressive manner, and was applauded; "My pretty page" came next as a duet by Miss Maggie Jones, Dowlais, and Master D. J. Jones, and was encored; to this succeeded "The village blacksmith," sung by Mr. John Griffiths, Dowlais, in his usual effective style, and was well received; after this came the comic song "The jolly miller," by Mr. E. Concert On Thursday se'nnight a very successful concert was given under distinguished patronage at the Board schoolroom, for the purposes of augmenting the funds of the Fochriw Cricket Club, when the following well-known artistes took part:- Miss Keturah Evans (Eos Alma), Miss Maggie Davies (Eos Fach), Dowlais, Messrs Tom Williams (Pontypridd), J. Griffiths (Dowlais), Watkin Evans and David Davies (Rhymney), W. T. Morris and B. Angel (Vochriw), W. C. Williams (Merthyr), Mr. D. Bowen, Dowlais, accompanist, and Mr. John Harris, Vochriw, conductor. The programme opened with a painoforte solo, "Welsh airs," very skilfully performed by Mr. D. Bowen. Mr. W. T. Morris followed "Land ho!" and then those sweet warblers, Eos Alma and Eos Fach gave a duet. "Over the hawthorn hedge," that they sang so prettily that an encore was demanded by the audience, and in response they gave "I know a bank." Mr. Tom Williams followed and sang "John Brown," which was encored. The trio, "A little farm well tilled," by Messrs. Evans,

Morris and Davies was well received, after which Mr. Berkley Angel sang a song very sweetly. After the duet, "Albion on they fertile plains," by Messrs. A long and interesting programme which included Recitations, Musical and Recital Competitions, and Songs was gone through, in a manner which met with hearty approval of the audience. It would be invidious to point out anyone for special praise, but we cannot refrain from mentioning the name of Mr Kirby, who elicited roars of laughter with his Comic Songs. The room was crowded, many failing to gain a sitting, an one of the most successful entertainments held in the neighbourhood. It closed with the National Anthem. At a late hour, a large display of fireworks took place, in honour of the visit of Mr. & Mrs. Kirby to the place since their marriage. The fireworks were supplied by Messrs. C. T. Brock and Co., of Crystal Palace, London.

Fochriw was en fete for this celebration. From early Guest Majority Festivities morn, the inhabitants of this colliery district were actively engaged in bedecking the streets, and by noon a complete metamorphosis had been effected. A procession, consisting of upwards of 600 children, gathered from Vochriw, Pantywaun, Brithdir and Cwm Bargoed, started at 1.30 from the Board school, led by the Fochriw Brass Band. A Welsh goat immediately following, while Mr T. Bevan, the manager, and the majority of the principal inhabitants occupied prominent positions. After parading the village, a return was made to the Board School, where the children had tea and cake. After tea, sports and other amusements were held on the mountain, where swings, a greasy pole and an "Aunt Sally" had been erected. The sports included tug of war and various races. A timbering competition was also promoted, the winners being 1st (15s.) W. Lewis; 2nd (10s.) W. Griffiths; 3rd (5s.) D. Morgan. Messrs. T. Roberts, E. Williams (undermanagers), and E. Williams (checkweigher), acted as judges, and the racing arrangements were in the hands of Messrs. J. Evans, E. Davies, H. Jones and J. Edwards. In the evening, a huge bonfire was kindled on the tips, and a grand display of fireworks, supervised by Messrs. John Bevan, T. Williams and T. Grainger, concluded the day's festivities.

Large and appreciative congregations attended the services, and the sermons gave ample proof of the abilities of the young men who are just entering a course of training for a ministerial career.

The morning was fine, and the start was made from Pontlottyn Station at 7.30 a.m. At Cardiff, the party transferred to the Waverley. Lunch was taken at Weston, followed by the usual visit to the beach.

Afterwards, the party drove to Worle and Kewstone. The outing was in every way pleasant one.

"Merthyr Express" 12 February 1898

Presentation On Saturday night, the 29th January, a very interesting ceremony was gone through in the vestry of Carmel Chapel, when Miss Margaretta Phillpott, the accompanist to the Pentwyn Choir, was presented with a gold brooch, suitably inscribed, in recognition of her valuable services. Miss Philpott has accompanied the choir at at least a dozen eisteddfodau. The presentation was made by Mr. Simon Evan Cole, the leader of the choir. Miss Philpott suitable replied. During the meeting, songs were given by the following members of the choir: James Jones, T. Davies, Joseph Shankland, Simon E. Cole, David Cole, J. M. Jones, Rees Jones, and recitations by James Davies, (chairman), David Evans, and Elizabeth J. Evans. In an impromptu reading competition the prizes were divided between Caradoc Shankland, David Evans, and James Pugh, while T. Davies and Caradoc Shankland took the prizes in an impromptu music reading. With the rendering of the quartette, a most enjoyable and successful meeting was brought to a close.

Davies, James Davies and Moodi Williams. The accompanist were Miss M. A. Thomas, and Miss Lilian Williams. The singers and players did their work in such a manner that everybody seemed quite pleased.

<u>Drama</u> A performance of the popular drama "Owain Glyndwr," was given by the Fochriw Dramatic Society at the Board School on December 22nd. The famous scenes which took place in the 14th century in connection with Prince Owain were reproduced in true Cymric style. Mr. Thomas Jones played the leading part, and he was admirably supported by Messrs. J. Cole, William Walters, James Davies, D. J. Thomas, and D. Evans. The other numerous roles were also well filled. The musical portion was superintended by Messrs. D. Davies (Pencerdd Morganwg) and W. J. Angel, and the recitations by Messrs. J. Davies and W. Walters, A.C. The party intends appearing at Dowlais on January 7th, and we predict a treat for the audience there.

A. Morgan); Mrs. Jones, 24 Guest-street; Misses Bevan, M. A. Thomas, Ballard, Payne, Elenor Davies, A. Evans, M. Jones, Williams, Mrs. Ballard, and Mrs. Thomas, Dynevor-street. The services of Mr. George Phillips, Mr. Harry Evans, Mr. James Williams, and Mr. M. Williams, were invaluable as usual, and last, but not least, the energetic chairman of the Reading Room Committee, Mr. Henry

Williams, assisted by the other members of the Committee, worked in such a way as to make the affair a grand success.

"Merthyr Express" 5 January 1901

Singing Cymanfa The second annual singing cymanfa was held at Carmel Chapel on Christmas Day. The conductor was Mr. Burkley Angell, the precentor of the chapel. At the morning meeting, Rev. L. P. Davies, Baptist minister, presided, and after several tunes were sung, an address was delivered by Mr. R. D. Jenkins, Brecon College. The afternoon meeting was commenced by singing Gwalia (I). This was followed by Miss M. Davies reciting a Psalm, and a prayer offered by Mr. G. Pugh. The president was Mr. John Jones. A solo, "Y Bugail Da," was given by Miss E. Jones, and the anthem "Duw sydd Noddfa" (Pencerdd Morganwg) was rendered. The speakers for the occasion, Messrs William Walters, A.C., and Thomas Jenkins, discourced briefly on "The Progress of Tonic-Sol-fa Notation." Rev. Jas. Jones, Independent minister, presided at the evening meeting. The hymn "O fryniau Caersalem" having been sung to the tune "Crugybar," Miss C. Lewis recited a chapter from the Scriptures, and was followed by a prayer from Mr. R. D. Jenkins. A solo was effectively given by Miss E. Jones, whilst Messrs. Evans, Cole and Pugh also spoke. The soiree was a success in every respect, and after all had partaken of supper, the advent of the new century was awaited.

<u>Cantata</u> A successful performance of the cantata "The Musical Village," was given on Saturday, 27th March, by the Noddfa Baptist choir, conducted in an able manner by Mr. Samuel Evans, Martin's-street. The work of Mr. Evans was greatly facilitated by the efficient manner in which the stage-manager conducted the movements. The performance was highly successful, and mention should be made of the fine rendering of two solos sung by Miss Lizzie Jones. The accompanist was Miss Lilian Williams.

Operetta The operetta "The Flowers of the Forest," was performed at the schools in full character on Friday and Saturday evenings by the Fochriw Juvenile Choir, under the conductorship of Mr. W. J. Angell. The event had been eagerly anticipated, and the performances exceeded the most sanguine expectations. A fine orchestra was engaged, and was composed of the following: pianist, Miss Lilian Williams; organist, Mr. R. Jones; violinists, Miss Evans, Messrs. W. J. Barry, L Evans (Dowlais), and D. R. Williams; piccoloist, Mr. E. Evans, Dowlais. Mr. H. Williams was stage manager. A feature of the proceedings was the magnificent rendering of the various choruses by the children, who gave ample proof of careful training by the conductor, as well as assiduous attention on their own part. The main artistes were: Mr. Tom Llewelyn, Master James Jones, Miss Blodwen Angell, Miss Laurie Angell, Miss May Angell, Miss E. M. During Thursday and Friday, Coronation Sports where held. Events: Two miles bicycle race - 1. W. Payne, 2. D. Lawrence; Half mile bicycle race - 1. T. G. Davies, 2. W. Edwards; 440 yards foot race - 1. W. E. Jones, 2. J. Edwards; 100 yards foot race - 1. R. Pugh, 2. W. E. Jones. Mr. J H Jones was manager of the committee, Dr. Eleazer Davies was treasurer, and Mr. Evan Evans was secretary.

The services of everyone were given free, and Dr. Davies, on behalf of the Reading Room Committee, expressed his appreciation of the troupe's magnanimous action.

The stage manager was Mr. William J. Ballard, and the music was arranged by Miss Lillian Williams, who also acted as accompanist. The schoolroom was crowded each night. Everyone did their duty well, and great credit is due to all the party for the able manner in which the piece was staged. Thanks are due to Mr. Haggar of New Tredegar, who supplied the scenery free of charge. The party will perform at Dowlais in a few weeks, when an opportunity of seeing this beautiful drama should not be missed.

Shankland; duett "Wicked Cupid" - Mises Jones & Jenkins; violin solo "Blue Bells of Scotland" – Mr. Barry; song "Peidiwch a dweyd wrth fy nghariad" - Miss Jones; song "O na byddai'n haf o hyd" - Mr. Jones; duet "A, B, C" - Miss Jones & Mr. Shankland; quartette "Good Night Beloved" - the four soloists; finale "Hen Wlad fy Nhadau." Jones, manager of the Fochriw Pits, and on Saturday, by Dr. Eleazer Davies. It was the unanimous verdict of all present that the entertainment ranked among the best of its kind ever given in Fochriw. Mr. Charles Payne was an excellent stage manager, and Mr. E. Griffiths, secretary, and Mr. Joseph Payne, deserve special mention for the hard work they put in to secure the financial success of the entertainment. The proceeds went towards the new Church and Institute shortly to be erected at Fochriw.

The latter part of the day was spent very enjoyably at Aberglais Pleasure Ground.

15 February 1908 Dramatic Performance at Fochriw The Fochriw Amateur Dramatic Society, under the able direction of Mr. W. J. Payne, has scored another success in the performance of the drama "Simon Lee, or The Murder of the Five-Field Copse," which was given at St. Mary's Hall on Thursday, and repeated on Saturday. The hall seats 300 people, and was crowded on both occasions. Their efforts on this occasion were, if anything, in advance of any previous production, and won the plaudits of the audience. The interpretation of the drama was in every respect creditable, and nearly all present were at times moved to tears, being completely carried away by the seeming reality of the piece; at other times the hall was ringing with laughter. Characters were sustained by the following: Mr. Stephen Lewis, Mr. W. J. Payne, Mr. W. Williams, Mr. L. Richard, Mr. J. Edwards, Mr. T. Baldwin, Mr. J. Lawrence, Mr. W. Gwynne, Mr. J. S. 22 February 1908 Entertainment Another of the series of popular entertainments was given on Tuesday evening, at the Church Institute, when Mr. J. C. Payne presided over an appreciative audience. The Church and Chapels were the centres at which much of the entertainment on offer to the people of Fochriw was centred. Records relating to 'entertainment' prior to 1908 are relatively sparce. In 1908, J.C. Payne became the local correspondent of the 'Merthyr Express' and from that time considerable detail was recorded. Therefore, for a fuller picture of the entertainment on offer to villagers, examination of the various chapel/ church records is essential.

18 April 1908 Cantata A cantata entitled "The Picnic Party" was performed in full character by the Juvenile Choir of the Independent Order of Good Templars on Saturday evening at the Church Institute. The 300 seats were filled at an early hour so eagerly was the performance looked forward to. Mr. Charles Payne thanked parents for the great interest they had taken in providing costumes, etc. The choir, conducted by Mr. David John Thomas, rendered the opening chorus with vigour and enthusiasm, thus winning the plaudits of the audience from the very start. The characters were sustained by the following: Miss Rachel Walters, Miss Lydia May Evans, Miss Gwennie Rees, Miss Hannah Evans, Miss Mary A. Walters, Miss Martha Thomas, Miss Edith Way, Miss Margaret Thomas, Miss Edith May Sibley, Master Freddie Williams, Master Rees Jenkins, Master Leyshon Rowlands, Master Willie J. Davies, Master Richard Jones, Miss Sarah Cole, Miss Hannah C. Jones, Miss Jennie Edwards, Miss Bessie Rees, Miss Maud Llewellyn. The artistes, choir and conductor are to be congratulated on the very successful performance. Excellent service was rendered by Messrs. Thomas Jones, Henry Seabourne, and Charles Payne, stage managers, and the accompanist was Mr. Roderick Jones. Mr. Edward Lewis proved in very energetic secretary.

The following programme of music was gone through, Mr. Evan Evans, Railway-terrace, presiding: solo, Miss Ceridwen Thomas; solo Mr. T. J. Davies; solo, Mr. Thomas Walters; solo, Mr. D. J. Thomas; duet, Mr. T. J. Davies and Mr. Albert Whale; song, Miss Mary Walters; song, Mr. James Jones; song, Mr. Benjamin Shankland; song, Mr. John Morgan; song, Miss Ann Griffiths. The accompaniments were played by Mr. Thomas Walters. Miss M. A. Ballard acted as treasurer, and Miss J. A. Jenkins as secretary.

25 April 1908 Organ Recital A special service was held at the Church of St. Mary the Virgin on Sunday afternoon in connection with the installation of a new organ. The organ is made by Messrs. Blackett and Howden of Newcastle upon Tyne, Glasgow, and Cardiff. The instrument has a splendid tone, and is beautifully finished. It has been built to the following specification, drawn out by Mr. D. I. Jones, Pontlottyn: Manual compass, C.C. to A., 58 notes; pedal compass, C C C to F, 30 notes; great organ - (1) Double Diapason, 16ft.; (2) Open Diapason, 8ft.; (3) Dulciana, 8ft.; (4) Lieblich Gedackt, 8ft.; (5) Principal, 4ft.; (6) Harmonic Piccolo, 2ft.; swell organ - (7) Geigen Principal, 8ft.; (8) Rohr Flute, 8ft.; (9) Viol de Gamba, 8ft.; (10) Vox Celeste (Tenor C), 8ft.; (11) Gemshorn, 4ft.; (12) Oboe, 8ft.; (130 Tremulant; pedal organ - (14) Bourdon, 16ft.; (15) Bass Flute, 8ft.; couplers - (16) swell to great; (17) great to pedals; (18) swell to pedals; accessories - two composition pedals to great organ; two composition pedals to swell organ.

- **2 May 1908** <u>United Choir</u> A meeting of the members of the United Choir was held on Sunday evening at Noddfa Baptist Chapel, when it was decided to compete at the Bedlinog Chair Eisteddfod, to be held on Whit Wednesday. The test piece is "Hallelujah Chorus." Mr. Daniel Jenkins, Emlyn House, was appointed conductor.

The antics of Joe Andy, Joey Oran, and the Two Jays, convulsed the large audience. Mr. John Tracy met with a hearty reception. Mr. Will Bluett, the pianist, sang two fine baritone songs, which were much appreciated. On Sunday evening, there was a crowded attendance at the sacred concert, "The Life of Christ" and other suitable pictures were shown on the Bioscope. Mr. Joe Andy gave a lecture, and also recited "The Blind Collier's Child." Mr. William Bluett sang "Ora Pro Nobis," and played suitable music to the pictures.
- 4 July 1908 Organ Recital A most enjoyable evening was spent at the Church of St Mary the Virgin on Thursday, when an organ recital was given by Mr. E. A. Evans, the talented organist and choirmaster of St. Peter's Church, Abercanaid. The organist displayed to the fullest extent his abilities as player and composer in an "Overture in C minor," written by himself. The playing throughout was of the very highest standard. The soloists were: Madame Kate Williams, Rhymney soprano; Mr. T. Phillips, Dowlais, tenor, Mr. T. Griffiths, Dowlais, bass, all of whom performed in pleasing and excellent style. There was a large audience present, who very much appreciated the excellent singing and playing. On Sunday evening a sacred concert was held.
- 25 July 1908 Entertainments On Thursday evening week, Mr. John Tracy gave another concert. There was a crowded audience, and a good programme was presented. A comic singing competition took place, the prize being won by Mr. W. J. Payne. The accompanist was Mr. W. Bluett. On Thursday evening, Mr Tracey gave his farewell concert to a crowded audience.
- **7 November 1908** <u>Dance</u> A Cinderella Dance took place at the Church Institute on Tuesday, under the auspices of the St. Mary's Guild. There was a large attendance, and there was dancing up to a late hour. Mr. Ted Maskill carried out the duties of M. C., whilst Mr. J. W. Hinton, Penydarren, presided at the piano. The secretarial duties were carried out by Mr. Samuel Thomas, Aelybryn.
- **2 January 1909** Cymanfa A singing Festival, in connection with the choirs of the Carmel, Nazareth, and Noddfa Chapels, took place at Carmel on Christmas Day. Miss Gertrude Williams and Miss S. A. Evans were the secretaries and Miss Minnie Morgan was the treasurer.

15 January 1910 Soirees in the Council School Sir - It is difficult to know why these entertainments are allowed to be carried out in the Council School, especially when the people are permitted to remain there until the small hours of the following morning. This is a direct infringement of the Council's regulations, and ought not to be continued. In the last soiree that took place there on New Year's Eve, some irresponsible lads indulged in ringing the school bell at intervals from half past 10 till half passed one the following morning, which disturbed the peaceful sleep of the neighbours. The children of the village were let loose, as it were, into the school, and allowed to run over the benches. Questionable comic songs were sung in different corners by the young people. There is more damage done to the school in the night like this, than in five years of ordinary classes. When the cleaners entered the school on the following morning, every thing was in a shocking state. It is high time to put an end to these practices. Different denominations have their vestries; why not use them for entertainments of this kind, as they have their tables and everything ready on the premises? DISCIPLINE

Mr. Keffi was also presented with a cigarette case this time by Mr. W. S. Williams. The following contributed to the programme: overture on the piano Mr. R. E. Jones; songs Messrs. H. Turner, Morgan Jones, H. Wilcox, Tom Jones, D. H. Evans, I. Martin, William Evans. A hearty vote of thanks to all the artistes and to the steward and stewardess, Mr. and Mrs. S. Phillips, brought the evening to a close.
- **29 January, 1916** Smoker A very successful smoking Concert was held at their The Rising Sun Inn, on Wednesday week, in order to bid farewell to Sapper John Williams, Royal Engineers, Plantation-terrace, before his return to France. The room was decorated with flags of the Allies and a crowded audience assembled, showing the respected in which the young soldier was held. Mr. Tom Jones was appointed chairman. In his opening remarks, he said that Sapper Williams had been at the front for nine months, and during that time had received severe shrapnel wounds in the leg, and had been badly gassed. He was not allowed to return to England but had to go into hospital at Rouen, afterwards returning to the trenches. He was sure that his friends would wish him a less unfortunate time during his next sojourn at the Front. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded the chairman, staff, etc., and all who had worked to get the concert to such a success, by the Rev. D. J. Jones, and seconded by Mr. Isaac.

28 May 1921 Exciting Carnival at Fochriw On Thursday last, a very attractive carnival took place under the auspices of the Relief Committee, and was favoured with excellent weather. A large procession was marshalled in the Co-operative Yard. It was composed of representatives, different characters, etc, and paraded the streets headed by the Deri Silver Band, under the conductorship of Mr. W. J. Powell. There was also a comic band under the conductorship of Mr. D. J. Davies, and the the Troedrhiwfuwch Jazz Band. The streets en route were lined with huge crowds of spectators and there was a fine display of bunting. Some of the various make-ups were really laughable. Leading the procession were Police Sergeant Williams, Counsellors Morgan Morgan and D. J. Thomas, and the Reverend Esaiah Williams. They were followed by: the St. John Ambulance Brigade, under Superintendent W. J. Ballard; the Fire Brigade, under the command of Lieutenant W. J. Payne; members of both Football teams in full playing order, and looking eager for the fray; the Jazz Band bringing up the rear.

After the parade, the crowd marched up to the football field to see the much talked of football match, playing as they were for the "Lock-out Cup." Hard training had been put in the day before. There were present several well-known playing managers eager to sign on some of the players. The referee was that well-known sport, Mr. Watkin Williams, who had been busy plotting the war paint on both teams. The linesmen were Messrs. Richard Davis and William Ballard.

The Wolves, captained by Mr. E. Lewis, were the first to leave the dressing room, in full war paint and flying colours. When they reached the playing arena the cheers were deafening. Following closely behind, and looking as fit as fiddles, with their Stars and Stripes flying, were the Spurs, under their captain Mr. John Thomas. Mrs. John Bevan kicked off.

The first part of the game was more or less devoted to Soccer, and a feature was the fine combination between Rees Thomas, Tom Thomas and David Lewis, but all their efforts came to nothing. George Jones, late of Aberaeron, was able to deal with all their shots turning the ball over bar in all directions. He successfully stopped two penalties, one from Bill Gittoes (late Arsenal) being a terrific shot. The Wolves then got going. Captain E. Lewis placed the ball nicely, and set Dan Bach and John Rees off at lightning speed. Ultimately a great shot from John Rees was punched out by Gittoes.

On resuming, Mrs. Hill kicked off. The Spurs got going now in style. James Davies and Tom Jenkins gave evidence that they are still possessed football qualities. Davies, with a fast grounder, scored, deceiving the goalie, who appealed for offside, but the referee was adamant. This dispute brought P. C. Benny Thomas on the scene, who threatened to lock up both goalie and referee.

The whistle then blew for lemons, and Nurse Thomas kicked off this time. Job Thomas, George Shankland and Bill Davies followed up in rare style. The Wolves were penalised for hands in the penalty area. Gittoes was entrusted with the kick. The force of the kick drove both goalie and ball through the net. The whistle was again sounded for lemons. Mrs. Rosser then kicked off, and George Shankland, going alone, beating man after man, scored a beautiful goal. David Lewis was knocked out.

The Ambulance Squad were marched up and, after examination he was carried off, the referee protesting. The Wolves, although a beaten side, were playing desperately. Captain Lewis tried to rally his men, and Evan Jones, E. Chaffey, David Harris, and Daniel Jenkins made repeated efforts to score without success. W. E. Jones and David Griffiths now came up in style, but Jones was a safe as houses. Job Thomas then scored the last goal, the Spurs winning by four goals to nil, amid scenes of wild enthusiasm. Dr. T. Stenner Evans presented the cup to the winning captain in a neat speech. The captain responded and was afterwards carried shoulder high to the dressing room. The money taken was handed to the Distress Fund.

28 May 1921 Sports On Friday afternoon, a fine programme of sports was held to on the football field, under the auspices of the Distress Fund. The Fochriw Brass Band, under the conductorship of Mr. W. J. Powell, played a selection of music, and the strong committee carried out the arrangements. 4 June 1921 Concert On Saturday evening, a grand concert was given at the Baptist Chapel, Penybank, in aid of the local Distress Fund. The chapel was well filled. The chair was taken by Miss Jones, headmistress of Penybank School. The artistes were really excellent, encores being the order of the evening. Mr. W. Deri Bowen, who is home on a visit, gave his services for the occasion. The following were the artistes: baritone, Mr. Clifford Davies, Deri; soprano, Mrs. H. C. Davies, Fochriw; baritone, Mr. W. Deri Bowen; tenor, Mr. James John Lewis, Fochriw; musical quartet, Messrs. Albert Mantle, Bob Rees, Tom Rees, Ben Shankland. Accompanist, Mr. Bowen, Deri. After the usual votes of thanks, the evening concluded with the singing of "Hen Wlad fy Nhadau," Mrs. H. C. Davies taking the solo.

4 June 1921 <u>Carnival</u> On Thursday last, another very successful Carnival in connection with the Local Distress Fund was held. The procession was formed up at the Co-operative Yard. The costumes were exceedingly good. The Jazz Band from Pontlottyn evoked a great deal of interest and merriment. The procession was headed by the Fochriw Brass Band, conducted by Mr. Albert Mantle. The band was follow by the St. John Ambulance Brigade, the Fire Brigade, the members of the Deri Gymnastic Team with their instructor, Mr. Henry Hufton, and members of the ladies' football teams. The streets were thickly lined with spectators, and all were thoroughly pleased with the display. After the parade, the crowd made its way to the football field to witness the eagerly anticipated match between Fochriw and Pentwyn Ladies. Both teams were played on to the field by the Band, and were urged on to victory by

their hundreds of supporters. Fochriw were captained by Mrs. Chaffey, the team looking very smart in their blue jerseys. Pentwyn were captained by Miss Blodwen Williams, the team looking particularly attractive in their scarlet jerseys. First, P. S. Kinsley Llewellyn and P. S. Tom Jenkins cleared the playing area with their dangerous-looking clubs. Mr. H. Roberts, the referee, in female attire, called the rival captains to toss for choice of ends. Dr. J. Stenner Evans kicked off in the first half, and Councillor Morgan Morgan the second. Despite heroic efforts, and end-to-end football, the game ended in a pointless draw.
