from 1 September 1981 - 31 August 1982

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When international conflicts dominate the headlines as they have in 1982 and when the Research Consultant of the Centre can call his latest paper "The Fiasco of Detente", it is more important than ever for the Centre to continue and develop its work for international peace and understanding, and for the people of Wales to be seen to be making their contribution to that end.

We have covered in the past year major world issues such as those of disarmament and development as well as raising over £30,000 for UNICEF during the International Year of Disabled People.

Amongst young people, over 140 international volunteers from many countries came to Wales to work on social service projects, while CEWC-Cymru are to be especially congratulated in having their syllabus on World Development Education (the first of its kind in the United Kingdom) accepted by the Welsh Joint Education Committee.

May I once again express my personal thanks for the continued backing of members of the Standing Conference, including local authorities, whose support has been outstanding, the secretarial staff and all those other supporters who have made such valued contributions to our work.

The Eighth Anniversary

On 23 October at the Temple of Peace, the guest speaker was Professor Charles Elliott, Director, Centre for Development Studies, University College, Swansea and the Director-designate, Christian Aid. Civic welcomes were given by the Deputy Lord Mayor of Cardiff, Councillor D P T O'Neil, and the Vice-Chairman, South Glamorgan County Council, Councillor Fred Cook. The Chairman was Hon Edward Davies. Over 300 guests attended.

Professor Elliott's subject was "The Brandt Report, the British Response".

The basis of Professor Elliott's address was an appeal for a "philosophic response" not only from the British Government, but also from the British people, for "the vision of a world redeemed from absolute poverty, from preventable disease, from chronic unemployment and from structural injustice" (Barbara Ward). The meeting was held in conjunction with UNESCO.

Activities

1981

i) International Residential Conference for Students in Industry, Aberystwyth, September 17-20. (CEWC-Cymru in conjunction with the Development Corporation for Wales.)

39 British companies and 12 European companies were represented, as well as the New England College (British Campus) with a group of American students.

The theme was "The Challenge of British Industry - the USA, Europe and Japan". Speakers were Dr Ian Barron (Inmos Corporation), Prof Glyn Davies (UWIST), Dr Takebi Otsubo (Japan), Mr Howard Chandler (Ford Europe), Mr Calvin Berlin (US Embassy), Mr E Bornemann (Thyssen (GB)) and Mr Brian Moffat (BSC, Port Talbot).

ii) World Food Day, Llandrindod Wells, 16 October (in conjunction with the United Kingdom FFHC)

The first World Food Day was marked by an all-Wales Conference on the theme: "Why is it that when a decade ago mankind was able to put a man on the moon, it cannot solve the world's problems of hunger and malnutrition?"

The guest speaker was the former deputy Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary, now Director of VSO, Mr Frank Judd. Expert panellists included Mr John Rowley (International Planned Parenthood Federation), Mr Robert Collingwood (EEC), and Mr M Mokammel Haque (Commonwealth Secretariat). The Chairman was Lord Gibson-Watt. Over 120 delegates, representing all aspects of Welsh life, attended.

The workcamp programme attracted good press coverage. Receptions were held to allow the volunteers to meet local authority leaders and representatives of the local community.

In addition more than 80 volunteers from the United Kingdom were sent to workcamps in Canada, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, France, Germany, Holland, Hungary, Ireland, Morocco, Spain and Turkey.

For the first time U.N.A. Wales sent a volunteer to Lesotho to take part in their summer workcamp programme.

Tenth Anniversary Appeal

An Appeals Sub-Committee was set up after the 1979 Annual Meeting to establish a capital base for the Centre of £250,000 to produce an income at a level which would secure more soundly the work of the Centre during the 1980's.

It was pointed out that the proportion of assured annual income through interest on investments was only some 25% of expenditure. So the staff had to spend an undue proportion of time in fund-raising at the expense of furthering the objectives of the Centre itself.

The Sub-Committee has set the raising of the final £100,000 as its target by the 1983 10th Anniversary Meeting. Mr. Aubrey Jones, Managing Director, Welsh Brewers Ltd, has kindly agreed to Chair the South Wales Committee with a target of £70,000. Mr. Gerry McMorran kindly served as Hon Project Director until August 1982 when he moved to N. Ireland.

Finance

Excluding special designated funds of £1634, £138,212 was held in the UNA (Welsh Centre) Trust at the close of its financial year on 31 December, 1981. Interest of some £17,500 helped to meet some of the core costs of the Centre so far as its charitable activites were concerned. While such reserves may seem at first sight healthy, the interest represents virtually all the assured income that the Trust has. If grants which are usually made on an annual basis were to cease, the lack of such reserves would mean the dismemberment of the Centre.

Each member organisation of the Co-ordinating Committee makes a contribution of £25 annually to the Welsh Centre for International Affairs account, which at 31 August, 1982 stood at £480.87 after a loan of £5,000 to the UNA (Welsh Centre) Trust. A proportion of the costs of the Annual Report was met from this account. For information there is appended a summary of the Trust Accounts.

LEGACIES AND GIFTS

Gifts made more than one year before death to a Charity are exempt from Capital Transfer Tax. In addition, legacies by will and gifts made within one year of death are exempt from such tax up to a maximum of £250,000.

Anyone kindly minded to benefit the Trust in this way should seek the advice of his or her solicitor on the substantial benefits involved.

COVENANTS

The Finance Act 1980 made new provisions with regard to gifts to charities in the form of a deed of covenant. Individuals can, in addition to receiving income tax relief at the basic rate of 30% obtain relief at higher rates of income tax which they may be paying and the investment income surcharge in respect of payments made on or after 6 April 1981. The amount relieved against the higher rates of income tax and investment income surcharge is limited to a maximum of £3,000 per annum. Your accountant would clarify any difficulties.

UN International Year of Disabled People

Donations continued to be received during the first half of 1982 for the special project for the work of the UN Children's Fund (UNICEF) in the Sudan, where there are seven and a half million children, of whom one in four will not see his or her first birthday.

When the project was closed, over £30,000 had been raised - an excellent effort.

A very sincere thanks is extended to all who participated in the project. UNICEF has estimated that £50 saves the life of a child. On that basis, over 600 children are now living because of the Wales IYDP project!

Special Papers

In 1982 the Welsh Centre published Special Paper No 9, "The Fiasco of Detente and its Lessons", by its Research Consultant, Goronwy J. Jones.

The paper attempts to show that the breakdown in the progress of East-West detente can be mainly attributed to (i) the shortcomings of superpower behaviour towards conflicts outside Europe, (ii) policies of ideological confrontation on both sides.

The conclusion is reached that progress towards detente depends on the observance of a code of conduct which recognises realistically the need for the NATO and Warsaw Pact powers not to interfere in any way in the domestic affairs of each other, and requires them to help the UN Security Council to play a more effective role in the settlement of Third World conflicts to prevent any state from exploiting such conflicts for unilateral advantage.

Contract with UNESCO

The Welsh Centre renewed in 1981 a contract with UNESCO to associate UNESCO with the Centre's Conferences on issues of particular importance to UNESCO such as world peace and development.

This is the latest in the growing series of links the Centre has established with international organisations in the eight years of its existence, including the UN, the World Bank, UNICEF, the Commonwealth Secretariat, the EEC and the European Court and Commission of Human Rights.

The United Kingdom Freedom From Hunger Campaign

The Committee, administered from the Welsh Centre, is supporting four main projects; two in India, one with the Bihar State Dairy Corporation, to set up a dairy in Muzaffarpur (£317,000), which was inaugurated on 12 March 1982 and the other a cattle improvement scheme with the Pradesh Dairy Co-operative Federation, Uttar Pradesh (£118,000); one in Malawi to develop a Nutrition Training Unit at Bunda

College, which was completed in 1982 (£87,000); and water-drilling with Family Farms, Zambia (£51,000).

Mr Malcolm Pill, Q.C., the Chairman of the Committee, visited the Indian projects in February together with Mr Ernest Mann, the Director of the Commonwealth Dairy Bureau, a member of and consultant to the Committee.

Reports of Organisations Represented on the Co-Ordinating Committee

The Organisations represented on the Co-ordinating Committee have made important contributions to the activities of the Welsh Centre, but it has not been felt necessary to refer to them specifically in each case. (a) UNITED NATIONS ASSOCIATION, WELSH NATIONAL COUNCIL

Annual General Meeting. The 36th Annual General Meeting was held at the Temple of Peace on Saturday, 24 April. Mr. William Davies (Cwmbran) and Mr Ray Palmer (Cardiff) were unanimously re-elected President and Hon. Treasurer respectively. At a subsequent Executive meeting, Mr Goronwy Jones (Bridgend) was unanimously re-elected Chairman. The following were (re-) elected to serve 1982-5 on the Executive Committee: Mrs. Irene Chamberlain, Mr Robert Davies, Mr William Davies, Mr Alwyn Evans, Mr W R Harris, Mr Goronwy Jones, Mr R S J Palmer, Miss Rhiannydd Thomas.

Policy Developments. Issues discussed during the year included Disarmament and Deterrence, Detente, the Bahai's in Iran, the UN Convention on Inhumane Weapons, British and other NATO countries' Arms' Sales Abroad, Twinning with a Developing Country and the Falkland Islands crisis when a telegram was sent to the Ambassador at the UN, Sir Anthony Parsons. Mention should also be made of the Special Delegate Conference on "Arms Control and Disarmament" at the Temple of Peace on 20 February, which among other things supported the Final Document of the First UN Special Session on Disarmament in 1978, expressed the hope for a positive Second Special Session in 1982 and urged support from HMG for the UN's role in the settlement of disputes.

Constituency Plan. With the appointment of Mr Tony Cheney as the UNA Development Officer under a MSC scheme, plans to establish groups based on Parliamentary constituencies were put into operation.

Womens Advisory Council. The Council held its usual quarterly meetings. Speakers included: Dr Ann Donald, University College, Cardiff, "Lesotho;" Dr A G Hopkin, Senior Lecturer in Education, University College, Cardiff, "Impressions of the Developing World", Mr W R Davies, "Progress and Proposed Developments for the Welsh Centre for International Affairs; Mr Goronwy J Jones, Research Consultant, Welsh Centre, "The Fiasco of Detente and its Lessons".

Membership. At the close of 1981, membership stood at 754, a decrease of 26 on 1980.

United Kingdom General Council, Oxford 2 - 5 April. The Chairman of the Executive Committee, Mr Goronwy Jones, and branch delegates, represented UNA Wales at the UK Annual Meeting in Oxford. Mr Jones moved the resolution on "Confidence Building and the Role of the UN", while Mr John Davidson (Montgomery County Committee) moved that on "British Official Aid", both of which were approved.

UN Second Special Session on Disarmament, New York, 7 June - 9 July. A telex system was established from New York via the London UNA Office with regular news of the proceedings. It was made available to interested parties.

(b) COUNCIL FOR EDUCATION IN WORLD CITIZENSHIP - CYMRU.

Annual General Meeting At the AGM on 15 May 1982, the following officers were unanimously re-elected: President: Dr. A. B. Oldfield-Davies; Vice Presidents: Sir Alfred Nicholas, Miss M M Copland; Chairman: Dr Glyn O Phillips; Vice Chairmen: Miss V Brown, Mr R C Parry, Mr J Watkins; Treasurer: Mr R C Parry

Annual National Residential Sixth Form Conference. The Sixth Form Conference, held at Coleg Harlech, Gwynedd, from 29 March - 2 April, was the main event of the year. It was a very successful Conference. Over 70 Sixth Formers from all parts of Wales attended. The theme chosen was that of 'Wales, Europe and the World', looking at the EEC in relation to national and international development issues. The Conference was made possible by a grant of £1,000 by the Commission of European Communities, London and considerable assistance was given by the Wales EEC office.

Notable presentations were made by Mr Aneurin Rhys Hughes, Chef du Cabinet to Ivor Richard, Professor John Garnett, University College, Aberystwyth, Dr Peter Dixon, EEC, London, Mr Rhodri Morgan, EEC, Wales and Mr Gareth Wheatley, N E Wales Institute of Higher Education. Further interesting contributions were given by Dr Tony Hopkin, University College, Cardiff, representatives of Third World First, Friends of the Earth, the Campaign Against the Arms Trade, and Voluntary Community Service, Cardiff.

The evaluative comments made by the participants were most encouraging and all appreciated the opportunity to discover more about the world and to meet fellow students from all over Wales.

Curriculum Development in Development Education - Mode II 'AO'' Level Syllabus on Development Education. The most significant achievement of the year was the acceptance of the syllabus on World Development Education by the Welsh Joint Education Committee. Passed on 4 May, the syllabus can now be taken by schools, from September 1982. Already, some fifteen schools have expressed keen interest and the year 82/83 will be seen as a pilot year for testing the course and encouraging further schools to take it up from September 1983.

An 'AO' Level (Alternative Ordinary Level), taken at 16+ is generally intended for lower sixth form pupils or equivalent College classes to study for one year, looking at the interdependence of our global society. There are two main sections, the Search for Wealth and Changing Societies.

A course bibliography has been prepared by Mrs Heard and the Resource Centre in the Temple of Peace is providing back-up facilities.

This course is the first of its kind to be introduced in the United Kingdom, and the CEWC initiative has the full support of all the major development organisations in Wales. Further resource centres are being set up, particularly at the N E Wales Institute of Higher Education and in the longer term at Bangor and Swansea.

Primary Teachers Conferences on Development Education. The 'AO' Level has established Development as a part of the formal sector of education and in conjunction with this effort, it is hoped to interest Primary School teachers in this area of the curriculum.

On 11 November an all-Wales Conference will take place. The Conference is being supported by the Standing Conference on Education for International Understanding. The programme will focus on practical teaching methods, looking

particularly at the Schools Council World Studies 8 - 13 Project.

Schools Conferences and Meetings:

6th Form Conference, Swansea, 21 October - One Planet-Two Worlds. 160 Sixth Formers participated in this Conference on World Development. Speakers included John Ford, World Development Movement, Dave Cartwright, War on Want and Chris Jackson, Oxfam (Disasters Office).

6th Form Conference, Croesyceiliog, 23 October - The Challenge of Development. Approximately 160 pupils were involved and speakers included Andrew Hutchinson, Christian Aid, Tony Hopkin, University College, Cardiff and twelve of his overseas students.

6th Form Meeting, Lewis Girls' School, Ystrad Mynach, 13 November. A Special meeting was convened for 150 Sixth Formers in Rhymney Valley to hear Mr Frank Field.

Donald Miller Public Speaking Competition, Cardiff 10 December. Seven teams entered. St. Illtyds College won the debate on the theme 'Western Civilisation Contributes Too Little To The Third World'.

Children's Christmas Party, Cardiff 18 December. This was jointly organised with Cardiff UNA and VCS for approximately 200 local children.

St Joseph's School Exhibition, Newport, 22 - 26 February 'Our World and You' An Exhibition was held at St Joseph's High School, Newport, for one week. It was an attempt to introduce Development Education to School pupils. This involved years 1 - 4 at the High School, together with the upper classes of 16 local Primary Schools. The Assistant Secretary co-ordinated a Conference Programme for the sixth form. Films, talks and activities were presented to the 200 pupils. There was also an inservice programme, arranged by the Assistant Secretary for Religious Education Teachers in Gwent.

The Exhibition attracted widespread publicity and involved not only all the participating pupils, but also local and national development organisations.

6th Form Conference, Theatr Clwyd, Mold, 26 Febuary. This was well-supported by 110 sixth formers and the guest speaker was Mr Ronald Higgins, author of the 'Seventh Enemy'.

Ogwr CEWC Committee held the Jacob Jones Public Speaking Competition on 4 March in Bridgend.

5th Form Mock UN Assembly, Temple of Peace, 12 March. The themes were 'East West relations are dominated by military expenditure' and 'Too much aid is being given to the under-developed countries'. Eight schools were involved.

6th Form Mock UN Assembly, Temple of Peace, 21 May. A similiar event was organised for Sixth Formers.

Schools Visits. The Assistant Secretary continued to make the school visits throughout the year, helping to maintain the personal links with the schools.

Sallie Davies Memorial Competition. This was run in association with the Annual Conference at Harlech. The participants were asked to design poster portraying one of the themes of the Conference. Next year's Competition will be run in conjunction with the WCIA Award Scheme in aid of UNICEF, when individuals will be asked to produce a creative design promoting UNICEF in schools in Wales.

I Y D P Campaign. The schools contributed well to the WCIA International Year of Disabled People, Sudan Campaign, which raised over £30,000.
