The Tenth Anniversary

Mr Ivor Richard, EEC Commissioner for Employment and Social Affairs, was the guest speaker at the Tenth Anniversary Meeting of the Welsh Centre on October 21 (in conjunction with UNESCO).

He addressed a full Temple of Peace on the theme "The Role of the EEC in the World of Today", covering the current economic recession in the Western World, relationships with the Third World and political co-operation within the community.

Second Annual Dinner

The guest speaker at the Second Annual Dinner of the Welsh Centre at the City Hall Cardiff, on July 31 was Shaikh Yamani, the Saudi Arabian Oil Minister.

The following account of his speech appeared in the Western Mail:

OPEC Chairman Shaikh Yamani yesterday warned there could be a new oil crisis like the one in the Seventies.

And the key to the situation was in the hands of the British Government, he said in Cardiff.

He urged Britain to keep North Sea oil prices stable.

The Saudi Arabian oil minister said that if oil prices dropped in the next quarter the result would be "a stop in activity in any alternative sources of energy".

"Another problem, even more serious, is the bank problem in the USA." he said.

The Shaikh predicted that if oil prices fell, many small and middle-sized banks in America would go bankrupt and that any crisis in the banking system would have repercussions worldwide.

He also urged a quick settlement to the Gulf war, saying it was essential to world peace.

Speaking at the annual dinner of the Welsh Centre for International Affairs, at City Hall, Shaikh Yamani said a peace settlement was essental to prevent a world crisis.

"This is one area where peace is a must because the Soviet Union will never find a foothold in our part of the world without the existence of that kind of dispute.

The war between Iraq and Iran is very serious because that is an area which gives the Russians an entry into the Gulf. This is important because by the end of this decade the Russian bloc will need to pay for their oil in dollars.

Letting that war continue is serious for the free world. We are feeling the gravity of the problem which is now beginning to show between the superpowers."

Viscount Tonypandy, the President of the Welsh Centre presided over the evening and the toast to Shaikh Yamani was proposed by the Hon Treasurer, Sir Julian Hodge.

Young People's Activities

These are mainly concentrated on the work of the Council for Education in World Citizenship-Cymru (CEWC-Cymru) in the schools and colleges, and amongst industrial apprentices (see page 14) and UN Association International Service.

CEWC highlights

Annual National Residential Sixth Form Conference; 'Nineteen Eighty Four', Coleg Harlech, Gwynedd, April 9-13 1984. The Conference was once again CEWC's main event in the year and as in previous years, proved very successful. A varied programme of lectures, films, discussions, simulation exercises and debates was aimed at comparing some of Orwell's famous 'predictions' with the realities of the world in 1984.

Lectures were given by distinguished speakers including Mr J L Brace (Secretary, WJEC), Mr J Rees (Editor, Western Mail), Rev T Evans (Christian Aid), Emeritus Professor I G John (UC Aberystwyth), Dr A Hopkin (UC Cardiff), Ms M Clarke (Educational Materials Editor, Oxfam) and Ms R Morley (Amnesty International). A lively and interesting debate on the subject of nuclear deterrence or disarmament was one of the high points of the week with Councillor Frank Evans and Mr Ian Campbell as main speakers. The Trade Game, a simulation exercise designed to illustrate global inequalities of resources and wealth, led by Mr David Griffiths of Pentrehafod School, was another event highly praised by the participating students.

As in the past, Local Education Authorities supported the Conference generously, sponsoring fifty-six places out of a total of sixty-five students who attended. Support was also kindly given by the Standing Conference on Education for International Understanding, the David Davies Memorial Institute, the UNA (Welsh Centre) Trust, the Freedom From Hunger Campaign and Miss Copland.

The 'AO' Level in World Development. With Mrs Alison Heard's appointment as Welsh Centre Fellow in Development Education at University College, Cardiff, the 'AO' Level project, pioneered by CEWC-Cymru, has a basis for considerable expansion. CEWC is working closely with Mrs Heard in its development. (See page 20)

A New Partnership. In March an innovatory Conference was held for 5th Formers of five schools in the Blackwood area of Gwent. Its unique feature was that it was organised as a joint project between CEWC-Cymru and the Blackwood Rotary Club. This opportunity to work in partnership with a group of people in a local community proved extremely successful. The Conference was well planned and organised and was clearly enjoyed and appreciated by the fifth form students who attended. They showed interest in the ideas on "Development and Interdependence" put before them and put forward their own opinions and discussed the issues raised later in the morning when small discussion groups were set up.

It is hoped that this partnership may be continued in future events in the area and that perhaps similar links may eventually be formed with local groups in other parts of the country who wish to be involved in the work CEWC undertakes in their area.

International Service Highlights.

Volunteers from many countries once again came to Wales to participate in UNA International Workcamps. In all, the programme consisted of 15 camps, involving 140 volunteers from 19 countries: Turkey, France, Belgium, Germany, Holland, Finland, Denmark, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria, Portugal, Poland, Ireland, Italy, Morocco, Hungary, Spain, U.S.A. Canada and the U.K. The list below illustrates the broad scope of activities covered by the camps and the number of volunteers involved. It is of particular note to see the renewal of links with Poland this year 20 Polish volunteers accepted invitations to take part in camps in Wales. Local as well as foreign volunteers benefitted from this opportunity to further their understanding of other cultures while performing a worthwhile community service.

The International Service has been growing steadily over the past few years and it is hoped that 1985 (International Youth Year) will usher in a new era of expansion. In conjunction with regional IYY committees we would like to set up camps in all of the Welsh counties. We are eager to hear from anyone associated with the Welsh Centre who has an idea for a camp or who can put us in contact with a possible sponsor in the North, Mid or West Wales areas.

Welsh Centre Fellow

The first Welsh Centre for International Affairs Fellow has been appointed at University College, Cardiff. Mrs Alison Heard took up her duties as Fellow in Development Education in the Department of Education at the beginning of February.

This is a promising new partnership venture between the Welsh Centre for International Affairs and University College, Cardiff, and exemplifies a new type of link between the institutes.

The Fellowship stems from the development by the Council for Education in World Citizenship-Cymru, the schools' arm of the Welsh Centre, of the first syllabus in Development Education, the 'Alternative Ordinary "AO" Level' to be accepted as an examination subject in its own right by any examination board in the United Kingdom, the Welsh Joint Education Committee.

The Fellowship's principal aims are to promote development education in Wales at all levels and to develop the new WJEC Alternative Ordinary "AO" Level syllabus in world development in the schools of Wales.

It has resulted from co-operation in the raising of funds and the pooling of academic expertise by various bodies such as Oxfam, Save the Children Fund, the Freedom From Hunger Campaign, the UNA (Welsh Centre) Trust, the Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust, the Department of Education at University College, Cardiff, the Centre for Development Studies at University College, Swansea, and the North East Wales Institute of Higher Education where there will be a North Wales base.

The syllabus has attracted considerable interest in England and enquiries have been received from Canada, India, Mauritius, Mexico, the Republic of Ireland and Turkey.

The following eighteen Schools in Wales are participating in the Academic year 1984-5: Ysgol Dyffryn Nantlle, Ysgol Syr Hugh Owen, Ysgol Tryfan, Ysgol y Gader and Ysgol David Hughes in Gwynedd, Aston College and Brigidine Convent in Clwyd, Pembroke School in Dyfed, Cynffig Comprehensive and Lewis Boys Comprehensive in Mid Glamorgan, Fitzalan High School and Radyr Comprehensive in South Glamorgan, Gowerton Comprehensive, Glanafan Comprehensive. St Joseph's Comprehensive and Pentrehafod Comprehensive in West Glamorgan and Tredegar Comprehensive in Gwent.

Hon Lecturer

As a furtherance of those links with University College, Cardiff, the Director of the Welsh Centre was invited to become an Hon Lecturer in the Department of Education.

Tenth Anniversary Appeal Target-£100,000

Through the hard work of the Committee and the generosity of supporters. some £80,000 including grossed-up covenants was raised by August 31, comprising some £30,000 in capital amounts and pledges of £50,000 over the next seven years. It would be most fitting if we could reach our target by the Eleventh Anniversary Meeting on October 26.

Very many thanks are extended to all those who have helped to make such progress possible.

Finance

Excluding special designated funds of £1,979, £217,629 was held in the UNA (Welsh Centre) Trust at the close of its financial year on 31 December, 1983 Interest of some £18,000 helped to meet some of the core costs of the Centre so far as its charitable activities were concerned. While such reserves may seem at first sight healthy, the interest represents virtually all the assured income that the Trust has. If grants which are usually made on an annual basis were to cease, the lack of such reserves would mean the dismemberment of the Centre.

Each member organisation of the Co-ordinating Committee makes a contribution of £25 annually to the Welsh Centre for International Affairs account, which at 31 August, 1984 stood at £296 after a loan of £5,000 to the UNA (Welsh Centre) Trust. For information, there is appended a summary of the Trust Accounts.

LEGACIES AND GIFTS

Gifts made during life or by will to a Charity are exempt from Capital Transfer Tax. Anyone kindly minded to benefit the Trust in this way should seek the advice of his or her solicitor on the substantial benefits involved.

COVENANTS

The Finance Act 1980 made new provisions with regard to gifts to charities in the form of deed of covenant. Individuals can, in addition to receiving income tax relief at the basic rate of 30% obtain relief at high rates of income tax which they may be paying and the investment income surcharge in respect of payment made on or after 6 April 1981. The amount relieved against the higher rates of income tax and investment income surcharge is limited to a maximum of $\mathfrak{L}3,000$ per annum. Your accountant would clarify any difficulties.

The Advisory Committee for Development Education and Information

The purpose of this Committee is to co-ordinate the very considerable amount of work done in Wales on development issues, so that duplication and overlap can be avoided and also to develop joint initiatives. An example of this was the appointment of a Welsh Centre Fellow in the Department of Education, University College, Cardiff (see page 20). The Fellow, Mrs Alison Heard, reports to the meetings of the Committee which supervises her programme of activities in conjunction with the Department of Education, which is responsible for the academic contact.

The Committee covered the following issues during 1983-4: Primary, Secondary and Tertiary Education, British Aid Strategy, Initial Training and In-Service Training for Teachers, World Food Day, S4C and Overseas Development Programmes, the Wrexham-Maelor Local Authority Initiative by the NE Wales Institute for Higher Education, Development Education and the Government, the UNESCO Inter-Governmental Conference on International Understanding. A media sub-Committee under the Chairmanship of Dr A G Hopkin was formed to extend liaison with S4C and the Independent Broadcasting Trust.

Information/Resource Centre

The MSC project involving the appointment of an Information Officer ended in April. The responsibility for running the Centre is now divided amongst members of staff, which has forced some curtailment in service. It is hoped that further help may soon be obtained.

The aim of the Centre is to provide information of a comprehensive nature on a variety of subjects concerned with international affairs, the Third World and development in general. Some of the literature is free. Interested parties are welcome to come to the Centre and use the resource for their own private study. The Centre will help to extend the service already offered to schools interested in the 'AO' Level World Development Project. The Centre also provides back-up exhibitions for the work of the Welsh Centre.

Register of Speakers

The Welsh Centre, through its Advisory Committee for Development Education and Information, has compiled a Register of Speakers of people throughout Wales, who are prepared to speak on a variety of subjects connected with development education. The Register is available from the Welsh Centre for 35p including postage and packing. A separate North Wales list is available from the Centre for Religious Education, St Mary College, Bangor.

Publications and Press Cuttings

The Welsh Centre regularly receives over 60 publications and reports on all aspects of international affairs from the United Nations, the Commonwealth, the EEC and other sources. A press cuttings service is maintained under the following headings: Europe; the Americas; the Communist Bloc; Asia; Middle East; Africa; Disarmament; Development and Trade; Environment; United Nations; and Domestic.

UNESCO in Wales

UNESCO is the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation, one of the specialised agencies of the United Nations family. Created in 1946, it is an inter-governmental agency made up of 146 member States.

The purpose of the organisation, as defined in its Constitution, is 'to contribute to peace and security by promoting collaboration among the nations through education, science and culture in order to further universal respect for justice, for the rule of law and for the human rights and fundamental freedoms which are affirmed for the peoples of the world, without distinction of race, sex, language or religion, by the Charter of the United Nations'.

Since a visit by Mr W R Davies, the Director, to UNESCO's Headquarters in Paris in 1980, a close relationship has developed between the two organisations. This was highlighted by a message from the Director-General of UNESCO, Mr Amadou-Mahtar M'Bow, in the 10th Anniversary Report.

UNESCO has been associated with our work in various parts of Wales, in line with its medium-term plan for peace. There were UNESCO exhibitions, and UNESCO publications and pamphlets were made available. There is also a UNESCO section in the Resource Centre at the Welsh Centre, while the Council for Education in World-Citizenship-Cymru promotes the ideals of UNESCO in its work in the schools in Wales. All this compliments the collaboration with the Annual Anniversary Meeting.

The United Kingdom Freedom from Hunger Campaign

Since being administered from the Welsh Centre, the FFHC has supported four main overseas projects, two in India, one with the Bihar State Dairy Corporation to set up a dairy in Muzaffarpur (£317,000) which was inaugurated on March 12, 1982 and the other a cattle improvement scheme with the Pradesh Dairy Co-operative Federation, Uttar Pradesh (£118,000), one in Malawi to develop a Nutrition Training Unit at Bunda College, completed in 1982 (£87,000), and water drilling with Family Farms, Zambia, completed in 1983 (£51,000). It has also donated £10,000 for long-term famine relief in Africa.

The Committee has supported the educational work of the Centre for World Development Education (CWDE) London, the Council for Education in World Citizenship-Cymru (CEWC-Cymru) and helped to fund the Welsh Centre Fellow in Development Studies at University College, Cardiff.

UNICEF in Wales

After a busy UNICEF World Children's Week during the third week in September, the main areas for UNICEF fundraising were based on a milk-round appeal through several dairies in both North and South Wales, which raised £1,500. Later, a newspaper appeal through the Post Free newspapers and the Cardiff Journal raised a similar amount. The Welsh Centre volunteer network ran three events and raised £400.

On December 9, the trophies for the Welsh Centre UNICEF Award Scheme were awarded by Mr William Davies, President of the Welsh National Council of the UNA at the Temple of Peace. The Award Scheme raised almost £3,000 for UNICEF and the participants included a wide cross-section of community groups, among them the Canton Salvation Army Band, Allders Department Store, UNA Rogerstone and a group from Fairwater United Reformed Church. Several schools and firms also contributed, the school raising the most money under the Scheme being Llandrindod High School. Altogether over £11,500 was sent to UNICEF during 1983.

The Director of the Welsh Centre was presented with a cheque for £9,000 at Rhydypenau Primary School, Bow Street, Aberystwyth, on Goodwill Day by Mr John Gwyn Jones, the Urdd Organiser, being the initial result of the Urdd Appeal for the UNICEF 'Water or Tears' Project, to provide wells in the Sudan. It has been estimated that some 80 per cent of communicable diseases are the result of dirty water. A further £3,000 has since been received.

Mr Davies attended the Annual Wales meeting of the Women's Institute at Carmarthen on April 19, when he presented awards to the Gwent Federation of WIs and to Rhosddu WI for their support of the UNICEF Award Scheme. The WIs of Wales have raised a total of $\mathfrak{L}5,000$ towards this project.

The Director also addressed the Soroptimists of South Wales at Porthcawl on April 6 about the project they are adopting for UNICEF's work in Senegal.

Reports of Organisations Represented on the Co-ordinating Committee

The Organisations represented on the Co-Ordinating Committee have made important contributions to the activities of the Welsh Centre, but it has not been felt necessary to refer to them specifically in each case. Summaries of their Reports are available on request.

(a) United Nations Association, Welsh National Council. The 38th AGM was held at the Temple of Peace on Saturday, March 24. Mr William Davies (Cwmbran) and Mr R Palmer (Cardiff) were re-elected President and Hon Treasurer respectively. At a subsequent Executive Meeting, Mr Alwyn Evans (Swansea) was re-elected Chairman. The following were (re) elected to serve on the Executive Committee, 1984-87: Mr John Burford, Mr J H Davidson, Mr Keith James, Rev D Roy John, Dr T P Jones, Dr Rosa Morris, Mr Dale Owen,

Mr M Peterson, Mr Alan Rowlands and Mr G Slade. The following were coopted for 1984/5: Mr Paul Barratt, Mrs S E Charles, Mr H V Davies, Miss Pam Hill, Mr Ifor James, Mr Allan Jones, Mr Moses Jones, Mr V L Thomas, Mrs V L Smith, Mr Alun Griffiths.

Policy Developments. Policy issues discussed during the period covered by this Report have included the UN, the future of Namibia, the Middle East, South Korean Plane Disaster, Central America, Geneva Disarmament Talks, US Foreign Policy, International Financial Institutions, Grenada, Lebanon, the UN Intermediate Nuclear Force Talks, Intervention in Anarchic Situations, UNESCO, the International Debt Question, Chemical Weapons, "NATO at the Crossroads" and the Crisis in the Gulf.

Membership. At the close of 1983, membership stood at 790, an increase of 48 on 1982.

Women's Advisory Council. The Council held its usual quarterly meetings and speakers included Mrs Irene John, "The Status of Women", Dr Rosa D'Sa, "The Brandt Report" and Mr Robert Davies, "International Workcamps". At the AGM on May 12, Mrs V L Smith (Swansea), was re-elected Chairman and Miss Pamela Hill, Secretary. Vice Chairmen are Mrs P Harrison-Roderick and Mrs F C Zaballero.

(b) Council for Education in World Citizenship-Cymru.

Annual National Residential Sixth Form Conference. As usual, this Conference held at Coleg Harlech, Gwynedd, from April 9-13 was one of the most important events in CEWC-Cymru's year (see page 18)

Curriculum Development. The 'AO' Level syllabus in World Development has now made considerable progress towards becoming an established part of Welsh Sixth Forms' curriculum (see page 21)

Gwent Sixth Form Conference: "Common Crisis: The Brandt Report", Croesyceiliog Comprehensive School, October 21. Over 100 Sixth formers from Gwent schools attended the conference where they heard lectures from Dr Rose D'Sa (UC Cardiff) and Rev Tom Evans (Christian Aid) and participated in the Trade Game.

CEWC/UNA Model Security Council Debate, Temple of Peace, November 18. For the first time, schools in Gwent as well as South and Mid Glamorgan were invited to this event. Over 200 sixth formers took part in a lively and worthwhile debate on the situation in the Lebanon.

Blackwood Fifth Form Conference, "Development and Interdependence", Pontllanfraith Comprehensive School, Blackwood, Gwent, March 6. (See page 19)

Lecture on Disarmament, Queen Elizabeth Cambria School, Carmarthen, May 22. This lecture given by Mr David Summerhayes (Disarmament Adviser to the Foreign Office), was the first event organised by the newly formed Carmarthen Branch of CEWC-Cymru, and was open to the sixth form pupils of five schools in the Carmarthen area.

Sallie Davies Memorial Prize. This prize has been linked this year with UNICEF's UK competition, Project Nigeria. Joint First Prizes of £50 each were awarded to Llandrindod High School and Llanfoist Primary School, both of whose entries have now been sent on as Wales' entries in the UK judging.

School Visits. In addition Miss Jane Hulley, the Assistant Secretary, has made over 50 school visits during the year, giving talks to pupils and advising staff on the services available to them from CEWC- Cymru.

(c) Freedom From Hunger Campaign (Wales). The Ladies Committee of the Wales Freedom From Hunger Campaign (FFHC) comprising 52 people from 31 organisations under the chairmanship of Mrs J T Morgan organised yet another successful Fair at the City Hall on September 13, this time for the Welsh Centre Appeal. The amount raised was £4,000. The Fair was opened by the Deputy Lord Mayor, Councillor S James. All the members are to be congratulated on the effort made. The Ladies are preparing for another Fair in aid of the work of UNICEF in the spring of 1985.

1984 saw the departure of Mrs Rayner Rosser, Assistant Director and Mrs Siobhan Ashley, International Service Officer. Mrs Rosser has joined the emergency planning staff of Gwent County Council, and Mrs Ashley a housing association.

Russell graduated in Economics with Politics from UWIST, and subsequently obtained his MA in International Relations at the University of Sussex. Fiona was educated at Wolverhampton, the South Glamorgan Institute of Higher Education and in Switzerland. She has worked in Saudi Arabia and also taught in the Sudan. Her appointment has been made possible by a second grant from the Wales Council of Voluntary Action of £7,110.

The three members of the MSC project team, Mr Robert Douglas, Mrs Frances Palfrey and Mrs Gill Ashman left when the project expired in April. We wish them well.
