TREATMENT NOT TRIDENT

BRITAIN CANNOT AFFORD TO CONTINUE ITS OWN (PRIVATE) ARMS RACE - THE TRIDENT MISSILE SYSTEM - AS WELL AS SAFEGUARDING THE HEALTH NEEDS OF ITS PEOPLE

This is becoming clearer month by month when we look at the spending on the National Health Service in real terms. In 1948 the NHS was set up to provide free and comprehensive health care for everyone in Britain. It was an example to the world, but by now I do not think that any of us can be satisfied, let alone proud of the scope of our health services, or of our contribution to improving health in the third world.

To give but a few examples:

In 1984 Britain spent 5.4% of its gross national product on its health services, while Sweden spent 10%, USA 9.5%,

France and Germany 8%

The infant mortality rate (death in the first year of life) has long been seen as an indicator of the health of a nation. In 1982 Britain was 12th in table, Sweden and Japan were the top two.

The cost of one Trident submarine is forty times the amount Britain spends a year on cancer research and three times the cost of eliminating malaria, which effects over a quarter of the world's population.

£11 billion (Trident's cost) - our entire foreign aid programme for the next ten years.

In 1986 CND Cymru plans to mount a campaign throughout Wales to make people more aware of the direct link between arms spending and health care, with particular emphasis on the Trident programme, which has hardly begun, but which will cost at least £11 billion. This obscene figure represents £30,000 a day for the next 1,000 years. What couldn't the NHS do with

We hope to be able to work with the Medical Campaign against Nuclear Weapons (MCANW), who are already deep into "Trident or Health" campaign, and there will be a workshop on the subject at St. Asaph on January 25th from which we plan to launch our 1986 Campaign.

The Carmarthen Campaign continues

To what length will Mr. Eric Alley, the Home Office adviser go, in order to force Civil Defence on the Councils of Wales? Even if we do not prevent the eventual construction of the Carmarthen Bunker; the campaign has achieved something, which it can be argued, is equally important - a real breakthrough in public opinion. It has forced a major challenge to established power, that of Carmarthen District Council and the Government/Home Office strategy on Civil Defence. 8,000 people of Carmarthen district signed a petition opposing the 'Bunker'

At the end of 1985 Carmarthen remained the only District in Wales to receive grant and approval for a Civil Defence Emergency Centre under the 1983 regulations. At an estimated final cost of £150,000 the scheme will have had by far the

largest grant and raised the most public opposition of any district scheme in Britain.

The dedication to this long running protest must stand out as an example to us all. What is happening in Carmarthen today

could happen in your area tomorrow.

KEEP SUPPORTING GREENHAM

It is certainly hard for us, warm and at home, to appreciate the courage and hardship suffered by the women who have camped at Greenham, on and off for over four years.

Everyone in this peace movement owes them an enormous

The press and media now ignore the Greenham protest as irevelent, but the following few lines tell a different story:

On October 26th, a letter appeared in the Guardian from a member of 'Cruise Watch', telling us that it was 3 months since a full American Cruise convoy had been able to leave USAF Greenham Common and roam the roads of southern

General Charles Donnelly, head of USAF in Europe, has admitted that it has become impractical to bring out full Cruise convoys because of the surprising persistence of protest by women at Greenham and by mixed groups at the supposedly secret launching sites.

The original and intended form of Cruise convoy deployment comprises: 22 vehicles stretching over one quarter of a mile, plus a big police presence, all travelling at

Cruise has been stopped in several ways:

By leafleting and the presence of hundreds of people, local communities have been informed even when national media turned blind eyes and deaf ears.

Vehicles in the convoys have been immobilised simply

by painting out their windscreens.

The US training programme has been so distrupted that officers now seem willing to let support vehicles trickle out of Greenham in only ones and twos, sometimes over several days, mixing with the daytime traffic. By various round about routes they meet up on Salisbury Plain. Days later, the cruise operators try to slip unnoticed out of Greenham in ordinary civilian cars. If they are lucky, they may be allowed to play for a few hours with a solitary cruise launcher kept permanently hidden in the British army barracks on Salisbury Plain; then they dash back to Greenham, mission not accomplished!

This must have been an embarassing three-month gap. The moral is that oppressive governments rely on us feeling powerless and overwhelmed: our silence is then taken as our assent. By actively denying the nuclear state our compliance,

we can start to divert resources from the means of death into

the means of life.
