
## 12 DAYS OF CHRISTMAS 2021

## St Hilary's Celebration of Winter's Eve

Here is Terry's round up:

Over £800 has been donated through the GoFundMe page. In addition, £125 was raised from the Mini Forager's Produce Market and we received £500 from Magic Little Grants. There were also many donations in kind and in time. Thank you to everybody who has contributed – Winter's Eve would not have been possible without your support.

The bulk of the funds have gone to the 9 performers who provided some great entertainment – Harp and Flute Recital, Adam Rosser Band and Carols Round the Village. Other bulky expenditure included heating and lighting the marquee and replacing some of the Christmas lights. Donations also helped to fund the children's mini party on the day of the Festive Trail and the hire of the village hall and chairs for that event and for the Festival of Winter's Eve. In addition, a contribution has been made to the Forum's marquee replacement fund. There was also expenditure on goodies for the children including bell wrist bands, mulled wine for the adults and mince pies for everybody.

Currently, Winter's Eve has broken even – but it would be good if we can top it up just a little bit more. Plans include:

- Covering the costs of the annual village insurance. (In addition to providing cover for erecting the marquee and putting up the village Christmas lights the policy provides ongoing cover for litter picking, telephone box collections and other projects).
- Renewing some of the lights in particular the icicle lights round the village hall need replacing (they only have one mode, which is continual flashing!!)
- Having a little bit in reserve for projects in 2022. For example, easter eggs were given to all the children in the village from the funds from Winter's Eve 2020.

## Winter's Eve Unsung Hero Award

One person in particular put in a terrific effort behind the scenes. In May he researched and identified a marquee suitable for the village. He led the marquee assembly and dismantling teams for the Village Lunch, Foraging Market and Winter's Eve (taking down the marquee after Winter's Eve was a very wet affair!) He investigated the best options for the festoon lighting for the marquee and along the church wall, and instigated the system of posts and wiring for the church wall lights (as well as getting power back to the church shed). In addition to all this, he designed the Children's Festive Trail with Jayne and had wonderful lights around his house for St Hilary's Trail of Festive Homes.

#### ST HILARY CHURCH

The long-awaited repairs to the church tower, which was becoming structurally unsafe, have begun and scaffolding has been erected. Without these repairs the church and churchyard would have had to close because of the danger of falling masonry.

The work will include repairs/renewal of lead work, repointing, rendering and lime wash of the parapet, repairs to fractured and loose parapet corbels, and, installation of new internal walkways. It is expected that the repairs and upgrade will take at least 8 weeks. The total net cost is £110,000.

Members of the church committee have been fundraising for some time to carry out these essential repairs and the congregation and villagers have raised £20,000 to date.

In addition, a group working behind the scenes has successfully applied for grants from Garfield Weston Foundation, CADW, James Pantyfedwyn Foundation,

Allchurches Trust, Hedley



Trust, Welsh Church Act Fund and The Diocese of Llandaff. The fees from the BBC for filming recently have also been added to the pot. There is still a shortfall of £17,000 which the Rectorial Benefice of Cowbridge has agreed to cover with a loan. This will have to be repaid over time and the church committee are hoping to organise events to help cover this.
