

The will of Thomas Thomas of Llanblethian, yeoman, dated 25th August 1702.

To be buried in the parish church of Llanblethian.

To his son William Thomas, £5 to be paid within a year after his death.

To his daughter Margaret the wife of Morgan George, £1.

To his niece, Joan Richards, ten shillings to be paid in the year after his death.

The rest of his goods to his wife Catherine Thomas, as executrix.

The mark of Thomas Thomas.

Witnessed by Joan Thomas of Coychurch, Thomas Wilkins.

Proved 30th September 1712.

to be paid him by my Executors hereafter named within
one year after my decease. I give and bequeath
unto my Daughter Margaret Thomas now the wife
of Morgan Gorge, the Summe of one pound. I
give and bequeath unto my Niece Joan Richards
the Summe of ten Shillings which said Summe last
mentioned are to be paid within one year after
my decease, And lastly I nominate and appoint
my Beloved wife Catharine Thomas to be my
whole and sole Executrix of this my last will and
Testament and doe give and bequeath unto her all and
singular my goods Chattels & Credits, In witness
whereof I have, this five and twentieth day of July
in the first year of Queen Ann. Annoq. Dni 1702
set my hand and Seal.
