## MINIATURE LAKE

At 11 o'clock on Tuesday morning flood water from the swollen River Thaw cascaded into High Street, Cowbridge, and formed a miniature lake in

the vicinity of the Town Hall.

As the heavy rains continued
the depth of the water gradually increased, while the inhabially increased, while the inhabitants of houses and shops in the vicinity frantically attempted to erect barricades against it. At 2.30 p.m. the water was two feet high, covering the pavements on either side for a distance of over 100 yards. Traffic along the road, which is the main highway from Swansea to Cardiff, was slowed Swansea to Cardiff, was slowed down by the water. A motortricycle driven by an A A officer

stalled in the centre of that town by the floods. flooded area, with the result that he had to dismount and the Brewery value. that he had to dismount and push his machine along. Police-men remained on point duty directing the single-line traffic permitted, while pedestrians without waterproof footwear sought "lifts" from passing vehicles in order to get through the flooded area.

At 3.30 p.m. the local fire unit commenced pumping the water away down-stream, under Coy. Officer Edwards and L.-Fireman Harris, and the waters gradually subsided. Three-and-a-haif hours later there were only small poois in the gutters, and
