

Between 1960 and 1969 the Cardiff Archaeological Society excavated a Norman ringwork at Llantrithyd in South Glamorgan and the report on the site is now available.

The discovery of the remains of a 'hoard' of silver coins during the excavations excited considerable comment at the time and provided a dated context for the site. Together with the quantity and richness of the other finds, they make this early base of Norman expansion into Wales of some importance to those interested in the Medieval period.

Chapters on the excavations and interpretation of the evidence are followed by specialist reports on the finds and a comprehensive historical background.
