COWBRIDGE is a parish and small market town, and contributory borough with Cardiff and Llantrisant in the return of one member to Parliament. It is situated in the rich agricultural district of the Vale of Glamorgan, in the hundred of its own name, Bridgend and Cowbridge union. It is in the diocese of Llandaff and deanery of Gro-Neath (lower division). Its distance from London by rail is 186 miles, Bristol 56, Bridgend 7, Cardiff 16, Swansea 40, and Neath 28.

The town consists principally of one large street, stretching from east to west, containing some well-built houses, town hall, and market house, and is divided by the river Ddaw, over which there is a good stone bridge. In Welsh orthography it is called *Pontfaers*, probably a corruption of *Pont-y Fón*, of which the English name *Cowbridge* is an accurate translation.

The figures of a cow and bridge are the arms of the town, and it is stated that when the bridge was first built, a cow driven by dogs took shelter under the arches, where she was so much entangled by her horns that she could not be extricated alive, and from this trivial circumstance the town is said to have received its name.

In the eleventh century the town was encompassed by a wall, by Robert de St. Quintin, one of the Roman adventurers who afterwards rebuilt and strengthened a castle called Llanblethian. The town is now governed by a mayor, elected by the burgesses for life, and two bailitis, elected annually.

The parish church, dedicated to St. Mary, is a handsome building; the living is a vicarage, consolidated with Llanblethian and Welsh St. Donatts, in the patronage of the dean and chapter of Gloucester, joint annual value of £300, and is at present held by the Rev. Thomas Edmondes, M.A. The parish church of Llanblethian is about a mile

distant from the town. There are also places of worship for Baptists, Wesleyans, and Calvinistic Methodists.

The only charity is the Free Grammar School, probably an offshoot of the great college at Llantwit. Sir Leoline Jenkins, judge of the Prerogative Court and Secretary of State under Charles II., who had been educated in the school, gave the site of the present school and endowed it. He founded six masterships, and provided that certain boys of great promise should be received free. The scholarships and fellowships originally attached to the school have been, as in most foundations, thrown open to competition by the royal commission, in granting to English boys educated in the school equal advantages with the Welshmen in competing for the scholarships and fellowships of Jesus College, Oxford. The present head master is the Rev. M. P. Williams, M.A. There is also a Board school.

Llanblethian is a small parish and village in the hundred of Cowbridge, Bridgend and Cowbridge union and county court district, situated about one mile from the above-named town. Its area in statute acres is 3148, belonging to various landowners, and the Marquis of Bute is lord of the manor. Its population in 1861 was 753; in 1871, 756.
