

COWBRIDGE, with LLANBLETHIAN

COWBRIDGE is a market town and municipal and contributory parliamentary borough and parish, in the Southern division of the county of Glamorgan, with a station on the Llantrisant, Cowbridge and Aberthaw branch of the Taff Vale railway, distant 172 (by rail 137) miles from London, 12 west from Cardiff, 3 south from Llantrisant and 7 south-east from Bridgend, hundred and petty sessional division of its own name. Eridgend and Cowbridge union and county court district, rural deanery of Groneath Lower (eastern division) and archdeaconry and diocese of Llandaff. The town consists principally of one long street stretching from east to west, and is divided by a small stream, over which there is a stone bridge of one large arch. It is lighted with gas by a company, and the drainage, though not complete, has already cost the corporation a considerable sum. The town is supplied with water from springs and wells.

In the year 1091 the town was encompassed with a stone wall, by Robert de St. Quintine, who also built the Castle of Llanblethian, of which only one gateway now remains standing. A charter was granted to the town in 1682 by Charles II. confirming the privileges granted by previous sovereigns, and the Corporation formerly consisted of two bailiffs, twelve aldermen and twelve capital burgesses, there was also a mayor, who acted as constable of the castle, but was not recognised as a member of the Corporation, although acting as a magistrate within the borough. Under the provisions of the "Unreformed Corporations Act, 1835" (45 and 47 Vict. c. 18), the Corporation was dissolved, but on the petition of the inhabitant householders a new charter of incorporation was granted in March, 1837, and the town is now governed by a mayor, 4 aldermen and 12 councillors. The county coroner acts within the limits of the borough. Cowbridge together with Cardiff and Llantrisant forms the Cardiff parliamentary district, returning one member to Parliament.

The church of St. Mary, COWBRIDGE, formerly a chapel to Llanblethian, is a building of stone, in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel, nave, south aisle, north porch, and a fine embattled western tower, containing 8 bells: in the church is a memorial to Dr. Benjamin Heath Malkin M.A., F.R.A., the historian of South Wales, who was buried here: the church was restored in 1851 at a cost of £1,300, and again in 1894 at a cost of £800, and affords 640 sittings. The register of baptisms for St. Mary's dates from the year 1713; marriages, 1753; burials, 1735.

The church of LLANBLETHIAN, standing on an eminence, is an ancient edifice of stone, partly Norman but with portions in the Gothic styles of the 14th and 15th centuries, consisting of chancel, nave, south transept, south porch and an embattled western tower with pinnacles, containing 6 bells: in the church is the recumbent effigy, apparently of a civilian, found in 1893, during the progress of excavations for drainage purposes, under the south-west buttress of the tower: the church was completely restored in 1907, at a cost of nearly £1,200, and affords 200 sittings. The registers of Llanblethian date from the year 1661. The living of Llanblethian, with Cowbridge and Welsh St. Donats, is a vicarage, net yearly value £250, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Llandaff, and held since 1904 by the Rev. Isaiah Roberts M.A. of St. Catharine's College, Cambridge, and surrogate.

The Welsh and English Baptist chapel, Westgate street, erected in 1828, is a plain building of stone, with sittings for 300. The Welsh Wesleyan chapel, High street, is now closed. The English Wesleyan chapel, Eastgate street, erected in 1839 at a cost of £1,350, is a building of stone in the Gothic style, and has 300 sittings. The Calvinistic Methodist chapel, in the Lines, is a building of stone, with sittings for 370.

The Town Hall and Market House, built by the Corporation many years ago, at a cost of £700, is a building of stone, situated in the High street, and will hold 350 persons. An Institute and Lecture hall was erected in 1895, at a cost of £700, of which £500 was given by the late Mr. Nathaniel Bird, of Cowbridge. A billiard room was added in 1913 at a cost of £200.

The market is held every Tuesday, and is purely agricultural. The great markets are held every fourth week, commencing Tuesday, January 13th, 1914, under the auspices of the Cowbridge and District Farmers' Co-operative Society, chiefly for cattle. Fairs are held the Tuesday before March 25th, May 4th, June 24th, Sept. 20th and the first Tuesday in December.

The Cowbridge and District Farmers' Co-operative Society was formed in 1914, for the sale and purchase of stock and other products.

Here is a district lodge of the Manchester Unity of Oddfellows.

The charities (a list of which is in St. Mary's church) are as follows:—Mrs. Katherine Williams, by will, dated 27th November, 1682, bequeathed the sum of £100 to the town of Cowbridge, the interest to be yearly paid for the relief of the poor of the said town and for the apprenticing and advancement of children. Sir Leoline Jenkins, left, by will, dated 20th June, 1685, the sum of £20 once in every four years, towards apprenticing poor children or clothing poor people of the town of Cowbridge, at the discretion of the master of the Grammar School. Mrs. Mary Wilcox also left two closes of land in the parish of Llanblethian, the rent of which to be yearly distributed to the poor of the town of Cowbridge, at the discretion of the bailiffs. Mrs. Rebecca Wyndham likewise left, by will, the sum of £100, which, together with the interest thereof, purchased the moiety of a tenement of lands called Pencod, in the parish of Llanilid, the profits of which to be applied towards apprenticing poor children of the town of Cowbridge, at the discretion of the minister and churchwardens for the time being. A house, near the Cross, in the town, one near the Weigh-house, and one near the Market place, and a field, called by the name of Tair Erw Heoly Smallway, in the parish of Llanblethian, are charged with the yearly sum of 12s. each, which is left to be distributed in bread to the poor of the town on every Sunday after divine service, at the discretion of the churchwardens. Mr. Walter Williams, by a codicil to his will, dated 16th January, 1795, bequeathed the yearly sum of £4 for ever, to be issuing out of the rents and profits of a tenement of lands called "The Paddocks," situated in the Western Village of the town of Cowbridge, to be paid to the treasurer of the town, and to be distributed to the poor of the town and parish of Cowbridge, at the discretion of the bailiffs. On Nov. 24th, 1840, Daniel Jones, of Beaupre, in the parish of St. Hilary, in this county, by his will, directed his executors should purchase as much stock in Consols as would produce a yearly dividend of £10, for the use and benefit of the poor, the money either to be divided among them in equal moieties, one at Whitsuntide and the other at Christmas, by the minister for the time being, or to be laid out by such minister in clothing, bedding, or firing, for their use; the above stock stands invested in the £2½ per Cent. Consols. Mrs. Charlotte Malkin by will dated 19th March, 1845, left £100, the interest (about £2 13s. 4d. yearly) on which is applied for clothing for the poor. On December 11th, 1845, John Frauncies Gwyn, of Ford Abbey, in the parish of Thorncombe, in the county of Dorset, by his will, bequeathed to the parish of Cowbridge the sum of £200, in trust, the dividends thereof to be supplied in such manner as the minister and churchwardens shall think fit, for the benefit of the National school for boys of the three consolidated parishes of Cowbridge, Llanblethian and Welsh St. Donats; but this benefaction is now applied for the support of the Sunday schools of these parishes. Miss Eleanor Savours' charity of £200, invested in Consols, produces a yearly sum, which is divided amongst the poor of Cowbridge, at the discretion of the vicar, and a similar sum for Llanblethian. Mrs. Eliza Llewellyn, of Cowbridge, by her will dated 23rd June, 1870, left £100 upon trust, the produce to be divided amongst the poor.

The kennels of the Glamorganshire fox hounds are at Llundough, about a mile and a half south of Cowbridge; Col. Herbert Richards Homfray J.P. of Penllyn Castle, master. The pack hunts thrice weekly. Cardiff and Bridgend are convenient places for hunting visitors.

Crossways is the seat of Sir W. James Thomas J.P.

The Marquess of Bute, who is lord of the manor of Llanblethian and borough of Cowbridge; The Earl of Dunraven K.P., P.C., C.M.G.; the trustees of the late John Samuel Gibbon esq.; the trustees of the late R. T. Bassett esq.; Capt. John Glynn R. Homfray J.P. of Grand Avenue mansions, Hove, Brighton; Mrs. Edmondson; E. Tudor Owen esq. J.P. of Ash Hall, Ystradowen; Sir W. James Thomas J.P. Crossways, and Mrs. J. D. V. Nicholl-Carne, of Nash Manor, Cowbridge, are the principal landowners.

The soil is clay and gravel; subsoil, various. The chief crops are wheat, barley and pasturage. The area of the parish of Cowbridge is 45 acres; parish of

Llanblethian is 3,250 acres and 13 of water; rateable value of Cowbridge, £4,031; of Llanblethian, £5,629. The population in 1911 of the parish and parliamentary borough of Cowbridge was 1,157; parish of Llanblethian in 1911 was 745.

The number of electors on the parliamentary register in 1914 was 195.

SCHOOLS.

The Grammar School, in Church street, founded in 1603, & endowed by Sir Leoline Jenkins, Judge of the Prerogative Court & Secretary of State in the reign of James II. was purchased by him of Sir Edward Stradling, of St. Donat's Castle, & subsequently devised to the principal, fellows & scholars of Jesus College, Oxford. He also founded, in connection with it, five monitorships, each of the present value of £15 10s. The scholarships & fellowships originally

attached to the school are now thrown open to general competition; & English boys who have been educated in the school for four years enjoy equal advantages with the Welsh in competing for the fellowships & scholarships of Jesus College, Oxford. Entrance scholarships for boarders & day boys are awarded annually in December. The present building, together with a residence for the head master, was erected by the principal & fellows of Jesus College, Oxford, in the year 1847. The endowment of the school has, since January, 1833, been increased by £200 a year, & in 1891 there was a further augmentation of £200 a year on a scheme arranged by Jesus College, Oxford, & the Charity Commission. The interior arrangements of the school buildings have been much improved. The principals and Fellows of Jesus College, Oxford, form the governing body. Rev. William Franklen Evans M.A. Jesus College, Oxford, head master; B. Hadland B.A. Oxford, mathematical master. Cowbridge County Intermediate School for Girls, now a Secondary school under the Board of Education, was established in 1896, under the provisions of the "Welsh Intermediate Education Act, 1889," & is controlled by the Glamorgan Education Committee. The head mistress receives a limited number of boarders at the School Hostel. Scholars are also allowed to reside in apartments approved by the governors & under the supervision of the head mistress, or in the Hostel as weekly lodgers. Scholarships & Bursaries: County Scholarships, entitling the holders, if from a public elementary school, to total exemption from school fees, or if other scholars to total or partial exemption from school fees, are available from time to time under the direction of the governors. Bursaries, entitling the holders to travelling expenses to & from the school, & a contribution for school books, stationery & lodging expenses (if any) may be awarded by the governors to deserving candidates. County Exhibitions: County Exhibitions of the

value of not less than £10 per annum, tenable at any university college or university, or other institution approved of by the Local Education Authority, are available for scholars of 16 years & upwards, who have been in the school for at least two years, or who are holders of County Scholarships. These exhibitions will be under the direction of the Local Education Authority. In 1909 the hostel was enlarged by the addition of two class-rooms, cookery room, gymnasium, laboratory & dormitory, at a cost of £4,000. Beyond the school is a large playing field, & the spacious grounds surrounding the school contain tennis courts & other accommodation for out-door exercise. Head mistress, Mrs. Ellen E. Forrester B.A. Wales, with five assistants & a special staff of competent travelling teachers appointed by the Local Education Authority. The school is managed by a body of ten governors, appointed by the Education Committee of the Glamorgan County Council; clerk to the Governors, William T. Gwyn, solicitor, Eastgate street, Cowbridge.
