

Parish Church. It seems clear that the Christian religion had been established in [Golant] long before the Norman occupation.

The Church so singularly shaped that it appears at a distance like the embattled tower of an old fortress has a nave, a choir under the central tower, an aisle with an arcade of five arches, extending the whole length of the south walls of the nave & choir, and a chancel with a North aisle to it - probably a Guild Chapel, and the Vestry to the East was an Almshouse. The tower is of a military type and is somewhat unique. The recesses in the ringing chamber might have been used to store "arrows". The moulded capitals and pointed arches of the interior indicate that it is Early English in style. The South aisle was built at a much later date. An entry in Dumbleton Register under date of 1921, states that it was erected in 1493 by Anne Neville, lady Anne of Warwick.

The Restoration of the Nave was commenced 13<sup>th</sup> April 1925 and completed 26<sup>th</sup> June 1926 (Services held at Town Hall) at a cost of £  
Mr. Guy Clarke of Llandaff was the Architect & Mr. Herbert Thomas of [Golant]  
the Contractor.

The Heating Apparatus was installed by Messrs Hilt & Sons Breford in October 1926 at a cost of £481. 10. 0. Mr. Edward Corlett, Breford Architect.

Electric lighting. Installed by Messrs L. A. Phillips & Sons. [Golant] in 1932 at a cost of £116. 7. 0. Switched on November 10. 1932 by the Mayor. Ald: A. T. Mills, Deputy Mayor and T. J. Prysoreth, Town Clerk, G. S. George, Churchwardens: V. S. George & C. E. Corrie Williams, Mr. Evans, Eastfield, Miss Margaret Jenkins (author Rose), Mr. W. R. M. Adams, Mr. J. P. Marks, Organist, Miss Jane Rees, Townswoman, Mr. Evan Warren, Rev. T. Parry Price, Vicar, St. Catherine's, Pontypridd.

Tower. The Roof was restored in August 1935 at a cost of £145.0.0  
Ceiling to Ringing Chamber in September 1935 at a cost of £ 25.0.0  
Ringing Chamber Floor, Restored in January 1936 at a cost of £ 48.0.0

Bells. The whole ring is very interesting as the only ring of eight cast by the joint founders, Evan and William Evans of Chepstow, 1722, and surviving to this day intact.

The Bells were removed and sent to Messrs Taylor & Co. Bell Founders Loughborough in June (Whitsun) 1935 to be reconditioned. They were returned in September, and re-dedicated October 2<sup>nd</sup> 1935, by the Revd. Frederic Hood, Principal of Pusey House, Oxford, grandson of the Venerable Archdeacon Frederic Edmondes, and great-grandson of Canon Thomas Edmondes, a former Incumbent.

The Sanctus Bell, used as fire-bell and curfew, is of ancient shape, without inscription. For many years it rested at the top of the Tower Stair leading to the belfry. This bell is now incorporated in the Steel frame. In days long by the bell was called Mary Rose. When heard by the children they cried home-wards. It was wont to be rung at 8 p.m. from Michaelmas to Lady Day, and for the rest of the year at 6 a.m.

All the Eight bells bear a medallion of the arms of [unclear], with motto entwining them.

The O is the medallion of the Arms of the Borough

The bells are mounted in Steel frames, resting on steel girders,  
replacing the old frames. This work was executed at the same  
time as when the bells were reconditioned, by Messrs Taylor at a  
cost of £367. A hatch in both ceiling & floor of ringing chamber.

The bells when reconditioned were turned a quarter.

See the fore-mentioned renovations and additions in restoration of nave.

Walls, ceiling, electric lighting, heating &c were carried out during the  
tenure of G. Williams, instituted & inducted 23<sup>rd</sup> Eley 1924.
