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C.A.D.S. In November, 1946, 13 enthusiasts gathered together in the Duke of Wellington Hotel. They had one aim and determinedly held to it, they decided to form the Cowbridge Amateur Dramatic Society. There were just sufficient players to perform a play but no technicians, no cash, no headquarters, and no equipment. Now 24 years later the Society are proud to present their 50th production.

For two decades the Society occupied premises for rehearsal, scene building and storage of equipment, generously given rent free by Mrs. Jeanie Miller whose husband the late Dr. Robert Brown Miller was an active member of the Society. During 1969 a site was obtained at the rear of the Sheep Market and a building erected at a cost of approximately £900. Lighting has been installed and the building is now in use as the club headquarters.

Since its formation the Society has donated more than £1,000 to various charities, most of this has been raised by the C.A.D.S. Carollers which has become a feature for many years, members of the Society dress in Victorian costume and together with choir-master, organ and organist tour the houses and inns singing carols.

Of the original members, but few remain. Since the first meeting in 1946, some 200 people have been involved in the productions and all have made their contribution to the success of the Society, the maxim being that all concerned are willing to subordinate their likes and dislikes to the essential task of putting on a play.

In conclusion it is realised that all credit must be given to you, the audience, to the people of Cowbridge and district, the Borough Council and the local press for continued support of the Cowbridge Amateur Dramatic Society.



#### AN INTRODUCTION TO JOHN AUBREY

John Aubrey's "Lives" are among the most brilliant of Seventeenth Century memoirs but the author himself is not widely known. He was born in 1676 in the County of Wiltshire. and he experienced the changing fortunes of the Civil War while an undergraduate at Oxford. At the Restoration of Charles II. John Aubrey was still a young man and it was not until 1697 that he died, during the reign of William III, aged 71. In his youth he inherited a prosperous estate but lacked the ability to secure it and lost everything by the age of 45. Most of his life was spent collecting scholarly information and scandalous gossip for other people and he produced a number of literary and antiquarian works. His masterpiece remains, unquestionably, his book of "Lives" which he managed to complete during a lifetime spent in other people's houses and lodgings, relying on the generosity of good friends and relatives. He says, of himself, that gratitude was his chief virtue, and it seems improbable that he was ever an unwelcome guest. The Lives were not published until after his death and the original manuscripts are now held in the Bodleian Library at Oxford. It is only in this century that John Aubrey has begun to be recognised as Englands first serious biographer and that he can now take his rightful place beside Pepys, and Grelyn as the greatest chroniclers of their, or indeed any age.


#### PRODUCTION NOTES:

#### The background to the Play

Eleanor of Aquitaine married Louis and became Queen of France at the age of fifteen. When she was thirty she left Louis and married Henry, then eighteen years of age, the heir to the Plantaganet succession in England and Normandy. When Henry was crowned Henry II, Eleanor became Queen. She produced for Henry what she could not do for Louis, male heirs, five in all, two of whom became Kings of England. She was immensely wealthy, and Henry by the marriage acquired Aquitaine and Poitou, very rich lands.

Henry was a great warrior and had many women. He eventually imprisoned Eleanor in Salisbury Castle and made Rosamond Clifford his mistress. Rosamond died in 1176 and a legend was created that Eleanor had poisoned her.

Some years before, Alais, daughter of Louis of France had been affianced to Richard, Henry's son, who was the heir to Aquitaine and Poitou. The Dowry for Henry was the Vexin, a coveted part of France. As was the custom the young Alais was brought up in the Court of her father-in-law-to-be, Henry, but the marriage to Richard was always postponed and eventually Henry made her his mistress. Henry used Alais as a pawn in the negotiations with two of his sons. Richard, although a great warrior was reputed to have homosexual inclinations and was certainly very friendly with Phillip, the young King of France.

Henry, at 50, needed to settle the succession and the Christmas Court at Chinon was held so that a family conference, one of many, could take place. Eleanor although in captivity was permitted to attend these Courts in spite of the fact that she plotted against Henry whilst in Salisbury Castle.

The Author has made the point that the play contains anachronisms in speech, thought, habit and customs etc. The way Christmas is celebrated for instance is deliberate and not intended to outrage the historical aspects of the script.




